Emma Renee Ellis Christensen was born to Calvin and PerLytha Medford Ellis on June 21, 1937 in Blackfoot, Idaho. She had one brother, Gerald Ellis, who enlisted in the Navy right after he graduated from high school. (He was one of those Red Devils-and he was very proud of that!!) She married Douglas Jack Christensen at a young age and they have 4 children: Karyn (Mark) Thompson; Kim (Virginia) Christensen; Kelly (Stephanie) Christensen; and Kasey (Stephanie) Christensen. 29 They have grandchildren and 43 great grandchildren.

She has lived in Caribou County all of her life, with the exception of 2 years, when she lived in Cheyenne, Wyoming. She went to Grace Elementary School until the 6th grade. She and her mother lived behind the Chadwick's store, then she and her mother moved to Soda Springs when dial telephones came in. Her mother was the Chief telephone operator. She didn't want to leave Grace, as she loved playing on the playground, playing hopscotch, run sheep run, Annie I over, Mother May I?, and such games as that with her friends. When she moved to Soda Springs, she was in 7th grade and made the cheer squad, and was a cheerleader through her Junior year. She met Jack when he was a referee for the junior high basketball games, and she was "the cheerleader!" He was a senior and "only had eyes for her!!" She claims that she and the other cheerleaders made up the Soda Springs High School school song that we sing today!!! She stayed with her Uncle Dave and Aunty Belle on the ranch that is now owned by the Robbins in Thatcher. She helped milk the cows, feed the chickens, feed the bum lambs, and gather eggs. She remembers cutting the heads off the chickens, and then having them for dinner!!! She spent a lot of time at Bill & Jamie Stalder's and their daughter Jackie, at the motel here in Grace. She and Jack had several businesses, which included 47 years owning the Arctic Circle; a Coast to Coast Hardware store in both Soda Springs and Salmon; a laundromat; a cattle business and a small ranch. Renee worked at Stoor's Grocery; the credit bureau, the Shell gas station, and tended children in their home. Renee has been to many rodeos, watching her husband Jack as he rode bareback horses. His nickname was "Bareback Jack!" Now their grandchildren and great grandchildren have a love for rodeo-which she says must have come from Grandpa Jack!! He would have loved to have been here to watch all of them. She feels very honored to have been chosen as the 2025 Grand Marshal of this years Caribou County Fair & Rodeo. She and Jack supported the fair and rodeo for many years.

HORSE - 3-YEARS-OLD AND UNDER PERFORMANCE RULES

Bridle Path Hack (Hunt Seat):

- This class will be judged 60 percent on performance, 30 percent on conformation, and 10 percent on appointments at the discretion of the judge.
- Horses to be shown at a walk, trot, and canter both ways of the ring. Horses to back readily in a straight line and stand quietly. Hand gallop at discretion of the judge.
- Horses are to be reversed to the inside (away from the rail). They may be required to reverse at the walk or trot at the discretion of the judge, but shall not be asked to reverse at the canter. Horses must be brought to flat-footed walk before changing gaits.
- Entries shall be shown with English snaffle (no shank), Pelham (with two reins), kimblewick and/or full bridle all with cavesson nosebands and plain leather browbands. Saddle hunting or forward seat; may have suede seat and/or suede insert on skirt.

Western Classes:

- Entries shall be shown with a stock saddle with good working equipment. There shall be no discrimination against any standard western bit. Horses may be ridden with snaffle, curb, spade, and bar bits or hackamore. Curb chain or straps may be used but must be at least 1/2 inch in width and lie flat against the jaws of the horse. No wire, twisted chain, tacks, or other metal may be used under the jaw or in the mouth, regardless of how padded or taped. No hackamore bits, easy stops, tie-down, tack collars or other equipment regarded as unsafe or inhumane, will be permitted.
- Horses are to be ridden astride in the ladies western pleasure, side saddle not acceptable tack for this class.
- The rider has option to the use of spurs, chaps, and carrying of rope, reata, slicker, and hobbles. Rider must be attired in western hat, long sleeve shirt, and boots.
- Horses may be ridden with either romal or split reins--except in classes where noted, reins will be held in one hand and cannot be changed during performance. Snaffle bit is a smooth bit with broken mouthpiece with a conventional O-ring, egg butt, or D-ring with ring no larger than 4 inches or smaller than 2 inches with an optional loose leather curb strap. Tom thumbs or long shank type snaffle are not acceptable in any snaffle bit class.
- Hackamore is only a rawhide or leather braided or rope bosal. Side pulls not accepted. Absolutely
 no iron will be permitted under the jaws regardless of how padded or taped.

HORSE - 3-YEARS-OLD AND UNDER PERFORMANCE RULES

Western Pleasure Classes:

• Open to horses of any breed or combination of breeds 14.1 hands and over normally used for pleasure to be shown at a walk, trot, lope, both ways of the ring, on a reasonable loose rein without undue restraint. Entries shall be penalized for being on the wrong lead. To be judged 60 percent performance, 30 percent on conformation, and 10 percent on appointments to enter.

Ranch Horse Pleasure:

The ranch riding horse should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of the arena and reflect the versatility, attitude and movement of a working horse. The class is judged on the horse's ability to work at a forward, working speed, while performing the required and optional maneuvers. The required maneuvers are the walk, jog, and lope (both directions), the extended trot and extended lope at least one direction as well as stops, back and one change of direction. The optional maneuvers are side pass; turns of 360 degrees or more; change of lead (simple or flying); walk; jog or lope over poles or other reasonable maneuvers a ranch horse could perform.

Western Horsemanship:

Western Horsemanship is designed to test horsemanship abilities of youth riders using western tack. It may be divided in two sections. Riders first follow a prescribed pattern of maneuvers at a walk, trot, or lope. Riders in walk, trot classes are not eligible for this class. Riders may be asked to ride as a group around the perimeter of the arena. Judging focuses on the rider's body position, seat in the saddle, and ability to control the horse.

Western Reining Classes:

- Horses will work a pattern and be scored on the basis of 60-80 points. Horses shall rein and handle easily with reasonable speed throughout the pattern.
- Horses to be ridden with two hands in a snaffle bit or hackamore designated class.
- Snaffle bit used as described in western classes.
- Horses will work individually. A judge may require any contestant to repeat their performance of any or all the various parts of the pattern. Horses will not be worked both ways of the ring on the rail.

G. ADVANCED CATEGORY: The intent of this category is to allow amateur photographers to

compete at a higher level. Also, the chairman reserves the right to place a photographer in this category if that persons' background and experience are beyond "amateur."
